WHEREAS, the City of Jamestown, through its Board of Public Utilities, owns four parcels of real property, and leases a portion of a fifth parcel of real property owned by National Grid, which is known as the Dow Street Substation Property and which is located in the Town of Ellicott and the Village of Falconer, between Dow Street and Tiffany Avenue, and

WHEREAS, the assessment of the four parcels owned by the City of Jamestown, which includes all improvements owned by the City of Jamestown (even those that may partially be located on land leased by the City of Jamestown), totals \$7,861,599, presently yielding a total of real property tax payments by the City of Jamestown of approximately \$333,889 to all subject taxing jurisdictions, and

WHEREAS, the City of Jamestown is the owner of more than fifty percent (50%) of the total assessed valuation of real property within the area sought to be annexed and, thus, represents a majority in assessed valuation of the real property in such territory assessed upon the last preceding Assessment Roll for the Town of Ellicott, and

WHEREAS, said Dow Street Substation property is located directly contiguous to the City of Jamestown border along Tiffany Avenue and is therefore eligible for annexation into the City of Jamestown, and

WHEREAS, the Board of Public Utilities, is desirous of saving the costs associated with the payment of real property taxes, reducing expenses and contributing toward stabilizing rates;

NOW, Therefore, Be It

RESOLVED, that the City Council is hereby requested to initiate the proceedings necessary to annex the property known as the Dow Street Substation with the understanding that any and all costs associated with the annexation proceeding will be borne by the Board of Public Utilities, Electric Division.

BY COUNCIL:

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Jamestown had received a request from its Board of Public Utilities to initiate proceedings necessary to annex the property known as the Dow Street Substation; and

WHEREAS, the City Council acknowledges the annexation of the subject property requires compliance with the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQR Act);

WHEREAS, the City Council has reviewed the Short Environmental Assessment Form; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has reviewed the petition for annexation in connection with the Dow Street Substation property; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Council of the City of Jamestown hereby accepts the form of the Petition for Annexation; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Council of the City of Jamestown hereby accepts the form of the Short Environmental Assessment Form; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Mayor is authorized to execute the Petition for Annexation and the Short Environmental Assessment Form for submission to and consideration by the City Council of the City of Jamestown whether to exercise its powers of annexation pursuant to the General Municipal Law.

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BY COUNCIL:

WHEREAS, the City of Jamestown (City) proposes to submit to the Jamestown City Council (Council) and the Town Board of the Town of Ellicott (Town Board) and the Village Board of the Village of Falconer (Village Board) a petition for the annexation of 4.00 acres of land situate in the Town of Ellicott (Town) and the Village of Falconer (Village) known as the Dow Street Substation to the City, which land consists of uninhabited land owned or leased by the City, including a portion of Tiffany Avenue (Action); and

WHEREAS, the City Council has received and reviewed a Petition for Annexation of the property known as the Dow Street Substation; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law, as amended, the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQR Act) and the regulations adopted pursuant thereto by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC), being 6 NYCRR Part 617, as amended (Regulations), the Council desires to comply with the SEQR Act and the Regulations with respect to the Action; and

WHEREAS, in furtherance of this objective, the City prepared Part I of a Short Environmental Assessment Form (EAF) for the Action, a copy of which is attached hereto as Appendix "A"; and

WHEREAS, the Council desires to act as the lead agency for the purpose of conducting a coordinated review of the Action and therefore, proposes to seek the concurrence of Town Board and the Village Board, the other "involved agencies" (as this quoted term is defined in the Regulations) with respect to the Action; and

WHEREAS, by Commissioner's Determination dated August 24, 2017, the NYSDEC Commissioner determined that the City of Jamestown is the appropriate lead agency for the review of the annexation;

WHEREAS, the Council desires to inform "interested agencies" (as this quoted term is defined in the Regulations) of the Action, which agencies are identified in Appendix "B" attached hereto, and to request their comments on the potential environmental impacts of the Action;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Council authorizes the following findings and determinations:

Based upon an examination of the EAF and the Council's knowledge of annexation proceedings, the Jamestown City Council makes the following findings and determinations:

- 1. The Action is described in the EAF attached hereto as Appendix "A"; and
- 2. The City Council of the City of Jamestown hereby declares its intention to act as "lead agency" for the purpose of undertaking a coordinated review pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act, in connection with the Action; which is the proposed annexation of 4.00± acres of land situate in the Town of Ellicott and Village of Falconer to the City of Jamestown;
- 3. After considering the scope and components of the Action, and the Regulations set forth at 6 NYCRR Section 617.4, the City Council of the City of Jamestown preliminarily classifies the Action as an Unlisted action under SEQRA; and
- 4. The Ellicott Town Board and the Village of Falconer Board of Supervisors are the only other involved agencies (as that term is defined in the SEQRA Regulations) and in order to coordinate the environmental review of this Action pursuant to the SEQR Act and the Regulations, the Jamestown City Council hereby determines to provide a copy of the EAF to the Involved Agencies and, in light of the NYSDEC Commissioner's Decision issued in August 2017, to request concurrence for the City of Jamestown to proceed as lead agency and to request any comments the Involved Agencies may have regarding the potential environmental impacts of the Action; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Mayor of the City of Jamestown, is authorized to take whatever steps are necessary to carry out this Resolution; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

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In the Matter of the Petition for the Annexation of Territory Adjoining the City of Jamestown located within the Town of Ellicott and the Village of Falconer

BY COUNCIL:

WHEREAS, the City of Jamestown is authorized and empowered by Article 17 of the New York General Municipal Law, Section 700 *et seq.*, to alter its boundaries by annexing contiguous land from an adjoining municipality upon the consent of the people, if any, who reside on the land proposed to be annexed and the consent of the governing board of each affected municipality, following a determination that the annexation is in the over-all public interest;

WHEREAS, a proposed Petition for the annexation to the City of Jamestown of certain uninhabited lands located in the Town of Ellicott and the Village of Falconer ("Petition") was presented to the City Council by Mayor Samuel Teresi on or about November 25, 2019;

WHEREAS, the territory proposed for annexation in the Petition generally consists of approximately 4.0 acres of land situate in the Town of Ellicott and the Village of Falconer, which is either owned or leased by the City of Jamestown and on which the City of Jamestown's Dow Street Substation is located, as more particularly described in the Petition and the Schedules annexed thereto (the "Territory");

WHEREAS, the Petition seeks to annex the Territory for the purpose of bringing the City of Jamestown's Dow Street Substation (the "Facility") within the City's territorial boundaries, thereby enabling the City of Jamestown to: a) exert greater control over the Facility and to better protect the Facility by providing the Facility with the full contingent of the City's municipal services; b) remove the City-owned property from the tax rolls of the Town of Ellicott and the Village of Falconer and reduce the City's expense for tax liability and improve the City's constitutional tax limit ratio; c) maintain the stability of the

City's utilities, thereby reducing the need for drastic increases in the utility rates over the next five to ten years; and d) incentivize business and industry to return to and develop in the City of Jamestown and surrounding area by stabilizing and controlling rates for utilities and decreasing tax liability; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has considered the proposed Petition and determined that it desires to pursue the annexation of the Territory from the Town of Ellicott and the Village of Falconer and that the Petition should be formally submitted to the City Council and the Town Board of the Town of Ellicott and the Village of Falconer for proceedings pursuant to Article 17 of the New York General Municipal Law; and

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS RESOLVED, by the City Council of the City of Jamestown (a majority of the members thereof affirmatively concurring) that:

- a) The City Council hereby determines to exercise its power under Article 17 of the New York General Municipal Law to entertain the Petition and consider the proposed annexation of certain lands to the City of Jamestown, in accordance with the procedures set forth in Article 17 of the New York General Municipal Law.
- b) The City Council, together with the Town Board of the Town of Ellicott and the Village of Falconer, will hold a joint public hearing pursuant to Article 17 of the New York General Municipal Law to consider the proposed annexation on December 18, 2019, at 7:00 P.M. at Jamestown Community College, Scharmann Theatre, 525 Falconer Street, Jamestown, New York 14701.
- c) The City Council will notice the joint public hearing in accordance with the mandates of Article 17 of the New York General Municipal Law.
- d) The Mayor of the City of Jamestown is hereby authorized and directed to do such further things or perform such acts as may be necessary or convenient to implement the provisions of this resolution.
 - e) This resolution shall take effect immediately.

Good Neighbor Deeds ("The Neighborly Nine")

- 1. The City of Jamestown has been and continues to be, by far, the #1 PROPERTY TAXPAYER to the Town of Ellicott, Village of Falconer, Town of Poland and the Falconer Central School District. In fact, since 2000, the City of Jamestown has paid the Village of Falconer, Town of Ellicott and Falconer Central School District \$13,487,340 in real property taxes. (See attached charts).
- 2. The City of Jamestown, through its taxpayer owned electric utility, has, for over a century, provided highly reliable, low cost service to residents and businesses in the Town of Ellicott, Village of Falconer and Village of Celoron. In fact, this service is delivered at about one half the cost charged by National Grid Corporation to its electric customers in other communities throughout the Greater Jamestown/Chautauqua County region.

City electric has and continues to be offered <u>to our suburban friends</u> at the <u>same rate</u> paid by customers within the city. It is also provided without the subject suburban communities having to share costs for system wide capital investments, exposure to lawsuits/general liability and the responsibility for covering annual net operating losses.

NOTE: The City of Jamestown Charter actually requires the Jamestown City Council to raise property taxes to pay any/all annual operating losses (including scheduled debt payment obligations) incurred by any of its city taxpayer owned utilities... <u>including and starting with electric.</u>

3. Over the years, the city has assumed responsibility for and operation of substandard suburban municipal water systems and voluntarily expanded its award winning service into other adjacent areas lacking viable, potable water. This regional approach has provided clean, safe, affordable and liability/risk free service to its neighbors. Additionally, this "good neighbor" gesture has not only achieved numerous public health and safety objectives (including improved fire protection service) for those outside of the city, but has also stimulated new suburban residential, commercial and industrial development projects... at times, to the detriment of the city's own tax

base.

4. The city previously assumed responsibility for the operation of a failed wastewater treatment plant and wastewater collection system owned by one of its suburban neighbors (Falconer/East Ellicott). This initiative, which included the city financing, building and continually upgrading a new and significantly larger facility, has also provided safe, affordable, environmentally compliant and risk/liability/worry free service for the residents and businesses in Falconer and Ellicott.

As with the previously discussed municipal water service, the city's wastewater operation has provided numerous public health and safety benefits to the subject areas. It has also helped to drive new suburban residential, commercial and industrial development projects... at times, to the detriment of the city's own tax base.

The city, through its wastewater treatment facility in the Town of Poland (easily, the #1 taxpayer to the town) also conducts sludge treatment for the county's South-Center Sewer District, serving West Ellicott, Busti and the Villages of Celoron and Lakewood.

- 5. The city has a long history of securing outside state and federal assistance on behalf of its suburban neighbors. For example, the city has applied for, received and successfully administered on numerous occasions millions of dollars' worth of state (DOT) and federal (CDBG, ARC, EDA, etc.) resources to implement a comprehensive, multi-year, multi-phase effort to literally rebuild the industrial infrastructure of the Village of Falconer and Town of Ellicott. This award winning initiative (The Chadakoin Industrial Revitalization Program) not only built and reconstructed roads, bridges, rail infrastructure, storm water drainage and utility systems, etc., but was credited with stimulating millions of dollars' worth of private investment and the creation/retention of hundreds of jobs by taxpaying businesses located within Falconer and Ellicott.
- 6. The city sought special permission to apply for and successfully secured nearly \$2.3 million in Federal Urban Development Action Grant (UDAG) resources on behalf of the Town of Ellicott and Village of Falconer... that neither entity qualified to obtain on their own. This funding was then used to provide direct financial assistance to and enable major economic development projects to move forward in the town and village.
- 7. The city has provided... and continues to provide... reduced/special incentive electric rates to some of the largest employers and <u>taxpayers</u> in the Town of Ellicott and Village of Falconer (i.e., SKF, Titan X, Monofrax, Truck-Lite, etc.)
- 8. The city continues to provide/share with and/or assist its neighbors with a variety of public services and projects, including, tax assessment, public safety mutual aid, Metro Drug Task Force, building demolition, construction of industrial parks, etc.
- 9. A variety of services (police-fire protection, street construction/maintenance, snow/ice control, storm water management, street lighting, public parking, traffic control, etc., etc.) are solely

provided by city taxpayers in support of <u>tax exempt, regional benefit</u> entities (i.e.: hospital, campuses, nursing homes, medical clinics, JCC, churches, arts and sports venues, library, government buildings, non-profit organizations, public parks, museums, cultural institutions, tourist attractions, etc., etc.), <u>that are used by and benefit the entire region</u>.

"One for the Road"

10. Unlike other jurisdictions, the City of Jamestown does <u>not</u> levy taxes on property that its municipal neighbors own within the city limits.
