






Retirement Contribution Rates







Constitutional Debt Limit


Jamestown's 2024 Executive tax levy is 78.24% of its taxing power.








- One-half million dollars for strategic demolitions of unsalvageable homes
- Expand home rehab program to provide affordable homes to firsttime, new homebuyers
- \$200k in new Sidewalk Repair Fund
- \$75k in new <u>storm sewer repair</u> <u>funding</u>
- Record streets funding remains



- Largest increase in police and fire staff in decades
- No cost to taxpayers using federal and state grant funds
- \$4 million in federal funding to public safety initiatives, \$3 million in state and federal grant funding



- Parks portfolio has grown in recent years (Riverwalk, Skatepark, new playgrounds)
- Next year is a record year of openings:
 - New splashpads at Allen and Jackson-Taylor parks
 - New playground equipment, volleyball court, and fruit orchard at Willard Street Park
 - Renovation of Roseland Park
- New hires for Parks workers to maintain and increase programming in parks



- Jamestown continues to apply for federal and state grant funding, reducing operating costs and funding new programs
- Allows City to grow without increasing tax rate
- Over \$3 million in grants secured for Public
 Safety last year alone
 - SAFER Grant saw 8 new firefighters fully funded



- Kept promise to regularly fund new public safety equipment in budget process, 4 new cars for police funded
- Improvements to Fire Department, with elevated capital funding levels to tackle deferred maintenance projects
- New money for sidewalk repair and storm sewers, making Jamestown more walkable and resilient
- Continued elevated CHIPS and Highway funding from New York State
- Increases in equipment funding for DPW/Parks
